

## Presidential Elections Middle School Teacher Instructions and Reproducible Activity

Students will use a fill-in-the-blank activity to organize information about presidential elections into a graphic organizer, which they can color and decorate.

**Supplies needed:** Graphic organizer sheets, notes, textbooks, other available reference materials, pens/pencils, colored pencils, and/or crayons

1. Distribute the fill-in-the-blank sheets and instruct students to complete these using the word bank. Post the word bank on the board.

## **Word Bank:**

candidate, inauguration, absentee ballot, slogans, pollster, veto, voting, term, election, Oval Office, ballot, platform

- 2. Give each student a graphic organizer to complete. Instruct the students to use the fill-in-the-blank worksheet to complete the graphic organizer.
- 3. The center bubble on the graphic organizer reads, "Presidential Elections," and three other bubbles are connected to the central bubble. Have the students label one bubble "President," another "Voter," and another "Campaign."
- 4. Each statement on the fill-in-the-blank sheets can be placed in one of the following three categories: President, Voter, Campaign.
- 5. Students will then organize the 12 statements from the fill-in-the-blank sheet into those three categories. There will be four statements per category. Students can write the numbers of the statements in the blanks.
- 6. Once the students have put the information on the graphic organizer, instruct them to lightly color the bubbles in the graphic organizer and then add their own art—donkeys, elephants, American flags, ballots, voting booths, presidents, etc., as space will allow.
- 7. Display on bulletin board.
