Harriet Tubman helped slaves escape to freedom. The escape route was called the Underground Railroad. There were no trains or tracks, just kind people who risked their lives helping others. If they were caught, they could be arrested or even killed!

Harriet made 20 trips, guiding more than 300 people to freedom. If someone threatened to turn back, Harriet would point her gun and warn, "Live North or die here...I never lost a passenger."

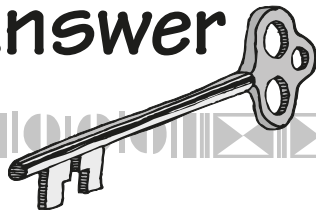

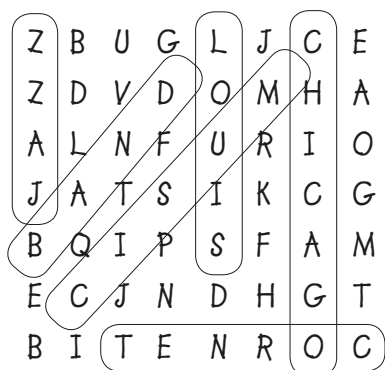
